EARLY RECOLLECTIONS OF TARA BY JOHN PENNINGTON #25

I've been asked to provide a few early recollections of Tara. I have lived here for 50 years.

In 1969 my deceased wife, Diane, and I visited the first 3 models of the first row and noticed that the rest of the 7 acres of Tara were undeveloped. Margaret Mitchell was crudely paved but with just a few houses on it. Clarendale was still unpaved. I-75 came up as far as Marietta and I-285 had just been finished all the way around Atlanta about the same time. The condominiums at 3021 Margaret Mitchell, across the street from Tara were not built until the mid to late 1970's.

We returned in 1972 and convinced the builder to sell us #26 which was then one of the two models. We liked the quality all brick construction. We paid \$52,000 for #26. If available, #25 would have been \$67,000. Mr. Campbell Napier, the builder, lived in #25 for several years and wouldn't sell.

The original plat for Tara called for several units in the grassy area between row 3 and 4. However a huge granite mound in front of #26 prohibited that row from ever being built. Our 4th row was finished in 1972, the row below us was still under construction. The bottom row was just staked out.

By the end of 1973 all 50 units were finished and lived in, the majority were young couples similar to us. That summer we had a gala party, the biggest ever, at the pool, complete with a live Hawaiian musical combo with 100% of the residents in attendance, many of us in Hawaiian outfits.

Several times during early ice storms I walked across I-75 to my office building on the other side of the highway.

It seems as though it was a year or two before the homeowners association took over management from the builder. My best recollection is the homeowners fee was approximately \$100 at the time. At that point homeowners managed everything including the financials. My wife managed the pool for the first 2 or 3 years before a pool company was hired. Originally gas was included in the monthly HOA payments. Also Tara exterior lighting was beautiful gas lit until at some point it was voted to change to electric lights. Rudimentary cable was installed through the attics. It was after the year 2000 that we hired the first real professional management company, Scott Carter Management.

In the context of 50 years here... I must comment on a couple of the original owners. A gentleman by the name of Lion Mason, in his 90's. He wrote his autobiography, 'A Lions Share'. He fought with General Pershing in the southwest against the Poncho Villa bandits and then with Pershing in WWI. He was an Air Force pilot during WWII, flying along the US coast looking for enemy submarines. He was our first real great character here at Tara. Also, Dante Stephensen, owner of 'Dante's Down the Hatch'. He drove a model A Ford 4 door convertible with a red lantern for a tail light. They contributed much to our early enjoyment.

Enough said. Tara has been a wonderful and quiet neighborhood to live in these past 50 years and I hope it continues to remain just as it has been.
